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FLOOD AWARENESS

Be Prepared!

Flooding is the most common and costly natural disaster, but only 3% of Virginians have flood insurance. It is estimated that one inch of water in a home can cause upwards of \$25,000 in damages.

Floods don't just hit coastal Virginia. In 2021, the remnants of Hurricane Ida caused devastating floods and mudslides in Buchanan County. In 2018, Hurricanes Florence and Michael tore through central and western areas of the state. During Hurricane Michael, the Dan River region alone suffered roughly \$12.9 million in damages. Floods aren't limited to mapped flood risk areas, either. In fact, many of the 2,000 homes that were flooded in 2016 during Hurricane Matthew were outside the mapped floodplain.

Flooding doesn't only occur during hurricanes or named storms. In recent years, western Virginia communities had severe flooding after experiencing heavy rain, requiring some residents to be rescued from their homes and resulting in damaged buildings and road closures.

Virginia Flood Awareness Week encourages Virginians to learn about their flood risk and protect the life they've built with flood insurance.


BE PREPARED FOR A FLOOD

- Know the types of flood risk in your area. Visit FEMA's Flood Map Service Center for information.
- Sign up for your community's warning system or set National Weather Service alerts on the FEMA app.
- Take photos of important documents and keep them in a waterproof container. Create password-protected digital copies as well.
- If flash flooding is a risk in your location, monitor potential signs such as heavy rain.
- Learn and practice evacuation routes, shelter plans, and flash flood response.
- Protect your property. Move valuables to higher levels, declutter drains and gutters, and install check valves. Consider a sump pump with a battery.

DID YOU KNOW?

There is at least a **26 percent chance** you'll experience a base flood during the lifetime of your mortgage.

TORNADO AWARENESS

#TornadoAwareness

March 11, 2025, was the Statewide Tornado drill! Did you participate?

Here are some tips on preparing for a tornado:

- Know your area's tornado risk.** In the U.S., the Midwest and the Southeast have a greater risk for tornadoes.
- Know the signs of a tornado**, including a rotating, funnel-shaped cloud, an approaching cloud of debris, or a loud roar like a freight train.
- Sign up for your community's warning system.** The Emergency Alert System (EAS) and NOAA Weather Radio also provide emergency alerts. If your community has sirens, become familiar with the warning tone.
- Pay attention to weather reports.** Meteorologists can predict when conditions might be right for a tornado.
- Identify and practice going to a safe shelter** such as a safe room built using FEMA criteria or a storm shelter built to ICC 500 standards. The next best protection is a small, interior, windowless room or basement on the lowest level of a sturdy building.
- Plan for your pet.** They are an important member of your family, so they need to be included in your family's emergency plan.
- Prepare for long-term stay at home or sheltering in place** by gathering emergency supplies, cleaning supplies, non-perishable foods, water, medical supplies and medication.



A tornado WATCH means tornadoes are possible in and near your area. Be ready to act fast!



A tornado WARNING means **Take Action!** A tornado is near. There is danger. Move to safe location right away.

BUSINESS CONTINUITY PLANNING

Be Prepared!

Is your business prepared for a disaster? Do you have a Business Continuity Plan in place?

Business Continuity Plan (BCP) is a collection of resources, actions, procedures, and information that is developed, tested, and held in readiness for use in the event of a disaster or major disruption of operations.

Having a Business Continuity Plan (BCP) helps prepare departments and businesses to continue essential functions after a major disruption.

Helps minimize the impact on your department, help reduce downtime, and help you return to normal operations as quickly as possible

Here are some helpful tips on how to setup a BCP:

- Identify your essential functions
- Identify resources needed by each function
- Determine the Recovery Time Objective (RTO)
- Conduct a Business Impact Analysis
- Determine your Recovery Strategies (Focus on three main resources: People Places and Things)



Assemble your Pet's Emergency Kit



Food and water (3 days), bowls, manual can opener



Medicines, medical records, & first aid kit



Collar with ID tag, harness, or leash



Crate or pet carrier



A picture of you and your pet together



Important documents: registration & vaccination



Familiar Items: Favorite toys, treats, bedding



Plastic bags/litter for cleaning up after your pet

3) Make an evacuation plan for you and your pets. Many hotels and shelters do not accept animal guests, other than service animals.





The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) has six sizzling tips to keep your home safe as the temps rise:

- Store gasoline safely (outside only!)
- Dry oily rags outside to prevent spontaneous combustion
- Handle flammable liquids with care—no smoking allowed!
- Give your grill a check-up before the first BBQ
- Clear out yard debris and dead vegetation
- Clean your dryer and keep the vent clear
